NICKY ISON – FIRST XI CAPTAIN

A second half comeback which can only be beaten by the time Manchester United come back from 3-0 down at half time against Tottenham to win 5-3 in September 2001, the Upminster 1st XI finally showed their quality in the latter end of the summer. We won 6 games in a row in July and August to ease any relegation worries and seal a mid-table finish.

A couple of very memorable wins were actually against two of the stronger teams in the league in Colchester and Hutton. A superb Shahbaz Butt match winning ton helped us chase down 236 at Castle Park, but even better was the demolition job done by Ejaz Khan and John Curtis who together routed Hutton for 49 all out. Mid-season addition Nabeel Aziz was crucial to our change of form – he finished the season with 21 league scalps, including two match winning five wicket hauls.

Due to a persistent injury, the experienced Ollie Peck stepped in for the 2nd half of the season and his nouse was also vital to the change of fortunes. CHANGES FOR BUY TO LET LANDLORDS

An issue which has affected a number of clients relates to the restriction of loan interest relief from 2017/2018. Some landlords with residential property have found their tax bills increase as a result of HMRC no longer allowing the full mortgage interest suffered against their property income.

HMRC have phased the restriction in relief, but the landlords to be hit the hardest will be those who currently pay tax at 40/45%.

In 2017/2018, the deduction against income will be restricted to 75% of the interest cost, the remaining 25% will be allowed as a basic rate tax deduction only.

In 2018/2019, 50% of the interest will be allowed as a deduction, 50% given as a basic rate deduction.

In 2019/2020, 25% of the interest will be allowed as a deduction, 75% given as a basic rate deduction.

From 2020/2021, all financing costs incurred by a landlord will be given as a basic rate tax reduction.

The restriction applies to the costs of dwelling related loans, but does not apply to furnished holiday lets.

HOUSE & GROUNDS

With the season now finished, attention has turned to post season preparation of the wickets at each of the club's grounds. Following some disappointing pitch marks and umpire's and captain's reports in the early part of the season, it was decided by the committee that the club needs to be proactive and look at long-term options in improving the facilities at the main ground. Over the years, the main square has gradually become raised and the incline into the popping creases has become more profound. In addition, the 'saddles' on the creases have also become more noticeable, which in turn affects the drainage and the overall quality of the playing surface. Furthermore, following a soil sample, undertaken by Phil Jeggo, the ECB County Pitch Advisor for Essex, it transpired that there was a 'root break' in areas of the square, which contributed to the uneven bounce and problems would persist unless the matter was addressed.

The committee met with groundsman Mark Severn and discussed the various options at length and it was decided that the square should be 'Koro' treated, or in simple terms, have up to four inches of the square removed taking the surface down beyond the root break. On 17th September, the tractors and machinery came down to Upminster park and over the course of a couple of days, the top surface of the square was shaved off, leaving it unrecognisable as a cricket pitch (see photos below).



Approximately twenty tonnes of soil was taken off of the entire square, which exposed the root break (below left) and the entire square was then dressed with three tonnes of fresh Ongar Loam and seeded. In order to protect square and give it the optimum opportunity to settle and grow, wire fencing was erected and the committee is grateful to Ray Calder, Stewart Hammond, Mark D'Cruz, Kevin Roome and Mark Schofield who gave up their time to assist just before the rain came on Saturday afternoon.



All that is now required is for mother nature to take her course over the winter months, before the square will be 'aerated' (or deeply spiked), to encourage root growth and prevent future root breaks, which will result in an even bounce and good carry of the pitch.

Although the squares at Coopers and Campion did not require the level of work needed at the main ground, both squares were deeply scarified and dressed and seeded by Mark Severn, with the help of Andy Berry & John Curtis (at Campion) and Josh Lamont, Tom Daniels, Dave Brown and others who assisted Mark at Coopers. The aeration programme will also be completed at Coopers and Campion over the course of the winter and it is hoped that the amount of time and money that has been invested in the playing surfaces will significantly improve facilities for all club members.

I would like to thank all of the members who have assisted in the various tasks at our grounds during the course of the season, your support has been greatly appreciated by myself and the committee. Enjoy your winter and I'll soon be badgering people for help with the start of season work in the spring!

ON THE FIELD

The performances of the 1st XI and 3rd XIs are well documented elsewhere in this newsletter, but the season turned out to be a relatively successful one for all of the club's senior sides, although that didn't always look like being the case!!!

The 2nd XI didn't take a wicket in the first two weeks of the league season, let alone win a game. The fact that they then made it to Week 17 with a realistic chance of claiming the Premier Division title is a testament to the character within the team, and the skills and enthusiasm of Billy Wright who took over the reins as captain when Ollie Peck moved into the 1st XI. Wright used 38 players, unheard of for the 2nd XI, but managed to get some brilliant performances from his side and for a while raised hopes of a first ever Premier Division championship. With the bat James Evans and Jordan Tigg were the most consistent performances but there were also eye catching performances from Harry Jenkins, with a remarkable match winning century against Harold Wood, and Terry Wyatt, with two brilliant hundreds to help win two further games.

With the ball the stand in captain led the way and was well supported by Mark D'Cruz, Arun Kullar, Mark Schofield, Nicky Ison and Will Chuter. There was also good signs for the future with promising performances from Ollie Heazle, Nathan Bright and Tom Daniels, the latter of whom took an amazing 6-25 to help secure a thrilling tie with Wanstead and Snaresbrook. With three weeks to go Ison claimed the winning Shenfield wicket with just a ball to spare to set up a title showdown with Brentwood the following Saturday. Unfortunately Brentwood proved too strong and went on to win the title, while Upminster, with a last day win at Woodford Wells, ended in third position to complete an excellent season.

After eight games of the season the 4th XI were without a victory and looked set for relegation. However, a change of captaincy seemed to inspire the side as it did the 2nd XI, and with Stewart Hammond at the helm the team produced a number of gutsy performances which ended with the team not only escaping the drop on the final day of the season, but climbing to a highest ever finishing position of 7th. In the first half of the season it seemed like it was Hammond alone who was playing the opposition as his batting kept Upminster in touch with the rest of the table. After a win in Week 9 over strugglers South Woodford, Upminster then put in two wonderful performances in the second half of the campaign to beat Wickford and high flying Billericay, and although they went into the final day of the season in the bottom two they knew a win and other results going their way would see them safe. Hammond, Ian Munn, Rob Mack and Sam Twine piled up the runs against already relegated South Woodford and then Rohan Mayor and Ryan Brown bowled them to victory. With other games ending as they needed to the side climbed to 7th. As well as the captain there were other good contributions with the bat during the season from Twine, Munn and the fast improving Will Frost, while Kevin Roome, Ryan Brown, Max Gordon and Frost shone with the ball. Karim Govani's 5th XI enjoyed a steady season, despite unusually poor availability throughout the club meaning the side looked very different from week to week. They went unbeaten for the first five games of the season and it looked like they may mount a challenge for promotion but the limited overs games were not to their liking and they lost ground on the leaders during that period. The star of the season was undoubtedly 12 year old Callum Berry who in his first season of senior cricket looked like an old hand with bat and ball. With the bat he was supported by Jake Eade, Alex Bottoms and the captain, while the captain also shone with the ball, as did the consistent Aalok Latey. Nathan Brown was superb behind the stumps throughout the season and a number of other youngsters also showed much promise for the future.

There was no doubt who had the toughest season at the club. The 6th XI suffered more than anyone from the club's availability problems and even conceded two games during the campaign (only the second and third time that has happened in the history of the 6th XI). That they managed to complete the season at all says so much for the enthusiasm of captain Ray Calder who managed to remain upbeat throughout the season. Ray was well supported by a few older heads, a few returning guests and two youngsters who despite the results never once complained or made themselves not available. Molly Amrani and Mushoon Mustofa will have learnt a lot from the season and we hope they both continue to show the same commitment, loyalty and enthusiasm for many years to come. It became clear during the year that this would be the last year, for now, that the 6th XI would be able to compete in the league, and so it was fitting that they finished the season with a fine win over Hutton, and that Mushoon was at the crease as the winning runs were struck.

Whether the 6th XI return in the future is down to the membership. Senior members who don't regularly make themselves available or drop out in the weeks before games need to ask themselves if they can show more commitment to the cause. The 6th XI has been a great breeding ground for so many of the club's youngsters over the years, a number of whom have gone on to play in the 1st and 2nd XI, and it is a shame to see it come to an end at this time.

Sunday saw the Sunday League side top the end of season Premier Division table, for the first time, but unfortunately lose out in the play offs to a strong Waltham side. Meanwhile the Sunday Friendly side, expertly let by David Brown, played a number of fixtures at home and around the County and thoroughly enjoyed the season.

Windmill Whack III concluded with an exciting final, on a chilly Bank Holiday weekend, with the Root 66ers seeing off the Govani Maestros to claim their first WW crown.

It was a shame that the final weekend of the competition saw some of the worst weather of a hot and dry summer, but that didn't stop the competition reaching it's climax and a large crowd taking in the action.

Sunday's semi-final play off, between the Maestros and Kushoom Bugh Tigers, was bought forward to a morning start as the weather forecast indicated heavy rain in the area from early afternoon. The Tigers batted first and moved towards a good total mainly thanks to the innings of captain Ant Limn. He looked set to make the first century of the 2018 competition before running himself out for 86 in desperate fashion! The Tigers still posted a competitive score but the Maestros made a good start in reply thanks to Josh Lamont. The promised rain soon began to fall and the game was brought to an early conclusion, with the Maestros progressing thanks to D/L.

With the rain set in for the day, the final was moved to the following day, the Bank Holiday Monday, and was preceded by the 160th Anniversary Match between Upminster and Ingatestone & Fryerning. Ingatestone won that game, by five wickets, and most of the players from both sides stayed on to watch the Final, meaning a large crowd was present for the occasion.

The Maestros won the toss and asked the Roots to bat, and it looked like a good choice as Lamont, Jordan Tigg and Connor Whetstone worked their way through the Roots powerful looking batting line up. It looked like the Roots fragile mentality was going to cost them once again on the big occasion, but captain Mark D'Cruz, not renowned for his batting skills, combined with youngster Sam Twine to allow their side to post a competitive total of 114.

D'Cruz then followed this up by removing Lamont for 0 as the Maestros chased victory, but Nathan Woods and Dave Wainwright got their side back on track with a good second wicket partnership. When they fell though, Twine and Mike Rath ran through the middle order to put the game back in the balance. With the run rate climbing Connor Whetstone became the Maestros only hope, and although he finished on 25 not out he couldn't find the boundary regularly enough, and with a lack of support at the other end the Maestros finished on 106-8 to give the Roots a tense 8 run victory. D'Cruz was deservedly named man of the match for his all round performance. Congratulations must go to both teams for reaching the final and to their sponsors, the Healthy Roots and Govani Chemists.

The competition was once again a huge success, with nearly 100 people taking part at some point during the summer and many close and exciting games being played. We must say a huge thank you to all of our six sponsors for making the competition viable, and also to Chairman Ollie Peck for co-ordinating the event, along with all those who scored or umpired any of the games and those who ran the bar and BBQs during these matches.

CHAMPIONS

It was way back on 1st September 2001 that the 3rd XI beat South Woodford in a Division 1 clash and claimed promotion to the Premier Division. To put that into context, it was the same day Emile Heskey inspired England to a 5-1 victory over Germany in Munich.

Since that time the 3rd XI have been a permanent fixture in the top flight, a period totaling 16 seasons before the 2018 campaign. In that time even Chelmsford and Wanstead have spent at least one season out of the division. It did nearly all come crashing down in 2015 but we won't talk about that at a time like this!!!

Prior to 2018 the side had finished 3rd three times and runners up on four occasions. For the most part those finishes came after spending the season in pursuit of Wanstead and/or Chelmsford, although in 2007 Upminster threw away their big chance. Needing just one win or a good draw from their final two games they were heavily beaten in both, and Chelmsford claimed the title (one of six in a row for Barry Clayden's side). The Upminster side was fiercely competitive over the years, well liked and respected by the opposition and known to have a good laugh along the way, but they had never quite had enough to win the title.

For 2018 there was a new skipper in place. Josh Lamont had enjoyed a title winning season as 4th XI captain in 2017 and had shown enough in his own game to prove he was more than ready to move up the sides. Josh had some new ideas and a different attitude to previous captains, and some of his views may have been seen as controversial by some, but underneath that was an astute and clever captain. As the season began Josh was careful to include a number of the "old guard" in the side but at the same time bought in some new faces who he trusted to get results.

The new style appeared to work well as the team shot out of the blocks with three wins in the first three weeks, including thrilling wins over Harold Wood and Wanstead. The good form continued and the team approached the halfway stage with a healthy lead at the top of the table. Individually the star performances had been shared around. The Limn Brothers, stalwarts of the club's 4th and 5th XIs up to this season, were in the runs. Youngster Tom Daniels was shining with bat and ball. Andrew Berry and up and coming spinner Nathan Bright were in the wickets. Veterans Pete Thompson and Rob Mack had made important contributions. And the captain was showing his pedigree with bat and ball.

But it was Week 9 that was to bring the most special individual performance of the season. The team travelled to Woodford Wells on World Cup Quarter Final Day and were left with a target of over 250 (not unusual on Wells' ground) to chase to keep their unbeaten run intact. Steve Limn proceeded to smash an amazing unbeaten 170 and, with help from Dan Tyler, victory was secured. It left Upminster with a substantial lead over Hornchurch, Wells and Brentwood as the second half of the season began.

That second half of the season began with a thrilling tie against Harlow and then a first defeat of the season against Wanstead, which allowed Hornchurch and Wells to close the gap just slightly. However, any concerns at that point were soon forgotten as three consecutive wins meant that with four games to go Upminster's lead was still 25 points. Those last four games looked very tricky on paper, three of them being against the three teams immediately behind them in the table, but the first of these was negotiated thanks to a real team effort at Brentwood. Chasing a tricky target of 173 Upminster held their nerve, most notably through Sam Twine and Will Frost, to pick up a two wicket win. Then on Week 16 disaster struck, and against of all people, old friends and rivals Hornchurch!!! On a typically sporting Coopers pitch, under grey skies, the 3s were shot out for 122 and Hornchurch cruised to victory. This not only meant Hornchurch were now within three points but Wells were also back in the hunt. Remarkably, considering the wicket at Monkhams Lane, Wells were somehow putting together a run of 25 point wins (by bowling out the opposition second) which had closed the gap on the top two.

The penultimate game of the season followed at Buckhurst Hill and after Hill had piled up 259-3 Upminster were 89-4 and looking in trouble. Had the side run out of steam at a crucial time?? Had the nerves got to them?? Worry not as youngster Tom Daniels and old head Rob White joined forces to push Upminster towards victory with a magnificent part-

nership. When they both fell, Daniels for a marvelous 82, Oliver White and Ant Limn, two unsung heroes of the season kept their nerve to see Upminster home. Meanwhile just a mile down the road Wells were at it again, picking up another 25 points with a remarkable performance that all but ended Hornchurch's title chances. What did it all mean?? Will Chuter wraps the last Wells batsman on the pads. Huge appeal, upheld by umpire Cyril Hickson and cue the celebrations. After 17 seasons and 306 games in the top flight Upminster were champions!!!

The game itself was a fitting way to the end the season. Two teams, who have always been good friends, competing to the last, playing the game in great spirit and then having a drink and laugh afterwards. It was a great advert for lower eleven cricket.

Many will debate why this Year was different and the team finally got over the line. Some will argue that the two big guns of the League, Chelmsford and Wanstead, were not at their best, and while that may be true it shouldn't detract from the brilliant performances that the team put in. Collectively and individually people stood up when it mattered and helped to win games. The team were also superbly led by Josh. Sometimes brash and occasionally rubbing people up the wrong way, underneath this bravado is a very clever and thoughtful captain. He backed his own decisions and trusted those he picked to deliver, and they repaid him by performing when it mattered. He can also play a bit himself, and will no doubt go on to represent the Club at a higher level.

The celebrations continued long into the night, and will still be going on at various events as you read this!! Those in the side will no doubt be boring future generations of the Club about their heroics for many years to come, but hopefully this will be the catalyst for other sides to push forward and bring home some silverware in future seasons.

2018 BENEFIT MATCH - REVISITED -

UPMINSTER CRICKET CLUB




On 6 October 2018, Upminster Cricket Club added Paul Middlemiss as it's 8th Life Vice-President. This is the highest honour the club can give one of it's members, and is awarded for exceptional and ongoing service to the club.

"Middle" joined Upminster Cricket Club in 1992. Despite being a newcomer to the game, it wasn't long before he was made the captain of the colts team, leading the side to numerous league successes and culminating in the team reaching the final of the Mobil Matchplay competition in 1996. This was a quite phenomenal achievement given the club at the time was playing in the Morrant League. It is a testament to Middle's leadership that most of this squad still continue to play league cricket for the club some 22 years later.

After continuing his captaincy with the Sunday Team, Paul moved through the sides and it was in 2004 when he broke into the First XI and was an ever present as wicketkeeper in the title winning side from Division Two.

As the club went through a boom period on the playing side, Middle found a niche for himself on the playing side as the Third XI captain, a role he took on for a number of years. Many stories hail from this era, and it was during this period Paul scored a Third XI record of 161 not out in an match away to Woodford Wells.



It is no coincidence that a number of younger players came through the side at this time who moved onto playing First and Second XI cricket with a good understanding of the game and the values of the club.

Having taken on other roles in more recent seasons including running the Seventh XI and Fifth XI to help bring through youngsters into the adult side, Paul has moved back up the teams and now plays again for his beloved Third XI. It was fitting that the team finally secured their first Premier League title this season with a defiant Middlemiss carrying his bat for 88 not out in the crucial last game of the season.

However, for all of Paul's efforts on the pitch, it is his off the pitch commitment to the club that sets him apart.

It was around 1997 when Paul became involved with the Club Committee, and a protégé for the future. Since then he has undertaken the roles of Chairman, Treasurer, Secretary, Chairman of Youth Cricket, League Rep, Bar Liaison Officer, Pavilion Club Rep, Pavilion Club Chairman, Press Officer, Benefit Match Secretary

and Chairman of Selectors.

In all of those roles, without exception, Paul has gone above and beyond what would reasonably be expected of him, and is also a constant sounding board for other officers and club members who need some guidance or assistance.

Basically, if it's got anything to do with Upminster Cricket Club, it's probably got Paul's fingerprints on it somewhere.

Perhaps the club owes Paul the biggest debt of gratitude is for his organisation of the annual Benefit Match against Essex CCC, which he has organised for the last 10 years. This is an event that is quite unique to Upminster both across Essex and much further afield.

As well as being a fantastic advert for the club in the wider community, it is a very important fundraising day for the club. The money raised from these events over the years has been crucial in a number of the larger projects the club has undertaken in recent year. Without these funds, the club would not be able to exist in the form it does currently.

In more recent season's Paul has spread his wings further and is now a committee member for the Shepherd Neame Essex League, and a Member of the Metropolitan Cricket Board.

The club is delighted to have acknowledged Paul with this recognition, and welcome him to the exclusive list of Club Life Vice-Presidents.


Plans for 2019 start now, so please do put your hand up and offer to run or support an event next year. New ideas are always welcome, so don't be shy!
